Providing Much-Needed Support

When the pandemic hit, local business owners across industries clamored for a chance to stay afloat. Lackawanna County, together with the PA CDFI Network and the COVID-19 Relief Pennsylvania Statewide Small Business Assistance Program, provided \$4.5 million in grant funds for qualifying businesses—awarding 230 businesses who were eligible for assistance with much-needed funds. This includes 122 women-owned businesses and 24 Historically Disadvantaged Businesses.
